The cycle of the Church year has come around again — already!!!

The Church's sanctoral cycle during these fall months seems to reflect the autumn theme of harvest. The feast of Mary's Assumption into heaven in August is at the vanguard. Then Christ as head of the Mystical Body which is His Church, is honored on the feast of His Kingship on the last Sunday of October. It is only by being His members, by being branches of the Mystical Vine, that we have His supernatural life in us. To Him be the glory of the victory won by each of His members: the Saints in Heaven, whom we celebrate and honor on November first, as well as the Souls in Purgatory, who though still in need of purification, have also passed the test by His grace. There is a beautiful hymn for All Saint's Day that encapsulates this in its opening line: "From all Thy saints in warfare for all the saints at rest, to Thee, O Blessed Jesus all praises be addressed."

Complementing idea, we have during the month of November two feasts of the dedication of a basilica: that of Our Savior on the 9th and that of Ss. Peter and Paul on the 18th. The Mass and Office for those feasts compares the members of the Church to living stones from which the walls of the New Heavenly Jerusalem are built. After we are hewn to shape by the trials of life, polished and bejeweled we are fitted into our place for the glory of God in His heavenly Kingdom.

After this glorious fall festival of the harvest of the Church, once more we plummet into the cold winter days which remind us of the earth plunged in the bitter darkness and cold of its fall from God. But the fullness of time was come and grace had

begun to dawn on earth with conception Mary which we celebrate in this frozen December. The glistening snow is a dim reflection of the luster of her spotless soul, and soon the cold will be melted by the furnace of her loving heart. Her sense of humor favored her humility as well. Once on being asked by some visitors who did not recognize her if they could see the Sister who saw the visions, Sister Marie Bernard replied that if they continued to watch the door, they would see her go through it shortly; then, passing through it, she never returned.

In the convent Bernadette was not understood by her superiors. Yet she humbly accepted the rebuffs of her novice mistress, bent herself to whatever task she was assigned, and diligently and tenderly cared for the sick Sisters in the infirmary while hiding her own illness and suffering. It is clear that she never forgot her beautiful Lady and the mission entrusted to her: to do penance, and to pray and suffer for sinners. Our Lady had told her, "I do not promise you happiness in this life, but in the next."

Still, Bernadette was quite human, as she herself admitted: "When my emotions are too strong, I remember the words of Our Lord: 'It is I, fear not.' I immediately thank Our Lord for this grace of rejections and humiliations... It is the love of this Good Master Who would remove the roots from this tree of pride. The more little I become, the more I grow in the Heart of Jesus."

Eventually, Bernadette was diagnosed with tuberculosis of the lungs and a tuberculor tumor of the knee. As her physical sufferings increased, so did her interior sufferings, and her soul was

plunged into darkness, which proved to her most bitter chalice. Yet her sweetness and patience remained. To a Sister who said she would pray that Our Lady to console her, she responded, "No, no, no consolation, only strength and patience." She died on April 16, 1879. Her last words, which she pronounced with great fervor, were, "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for me, a poor sinner, a poor sinner."
