The feast of the Purification, February 2, is the official close of the Christmas season. The Candlemas procession which takes place on that day is always a special event. The significant chant, Lumen ad revelationem gentium, echoes and re-echoes as we advance to receive our blessed candles.

This year, the day was made even more exciting for students in many of our schools as we joined together for the first time ever in a Zoom meeting to greet each other and pray together at the culmination of Catholic Schools week. On the feast of St. John Bosco a few days earlier, the students at Mount St. Michael sang a high Mass in his honor. The 7th graders at St. Mary's in Tacoma visited a local meditation garden and shrine of St. John Bosco, their class patron.

CMRI schools have as their theme for the year, "First the Cross, then the Crown!" This could be daily source of meditation for every Catholic to be sure, and it seems to lend itself well to our Lenten meditations. It also brings to mind that great lover of the Cross, whose feast day we celebrate at the end of April: St. Louis Marie de Montfort.

Most Catholics are aware of the treatise on True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary written by St. Louis. The Total Consecration to Jesus through Mary as taught by him in this book is the hallmark devotion of our Congregation. Perhaps less known, regrettably, is a remarkable little booklet entitled A Circular Letter to the Friends of the

> Cross. This letter was written by the Saint as the fruit of a retreat which he made during a time when he was forbidden to preach. It lays

out his own thoughts, based in Sacred Scripture, about the necessity of suffering and self-denial in order to truly follow Christ. St. Louis was no stranger to sufferings of all kinds. He lived in poverty, was often misunderstood and misrepresented, attacked verbally and even poisoned.

On one occasion, after a successful parish mission, a great number of people assisted the saint in erecting a beautiful Calvary scene to commemorate the event. On the day it was to be blessed, a message from the Bishop not only forbade the blessing but ordered it to be torn down. St. Louis addressed those assembled for the event with the news, and told them that Our Lord wanted them to plan the cross in their hearts instead.

A few lines from his little booklet will elucidate this doctrine of the Cross which the saint lived so well:

"Let him carry it, not drag it, not shoulder it off, not lighten it, nor hide it. Let him hold it high in hand without impatience or peevishness, without voluntary complaint or grumbling...Let him place it on his forehead and say with St. Paul: "God forbid that I should glory save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ.' Let him carry it on his shoulders after the example of Jesus Christ and make it his weapon to victory..."

The booklet ends with a thirty-one stanza poem which the saint composed called "The Triumph of the Cross." Here are but a few stanzas:

The Cross in mystery Is veiled for us below. Without great light to see Who shall its splendor know? Alone the lofty mind Shall this high secret trace, And none shall heaven find Who grasps it not by grace.
